
Thank you Nabbar Court for your Service, Leadership, Action, and commitment to our Youth. You S.L.A.Y.!!

The other side of the law!

The field of Law Enforcement has experienced a transformation within the last year. On May 25, 2020, the world changed as the video of George Floyd's encounter with the Minneapolis Police Department went viral. In response to the tragic death that many of us are all too familiar with at this time, the citizens of Minneapolis, along with people from around the world took to the streets. The actions of four police officers, whose duty is to protect and serve, was a tipping point for those who proudly wear the badge and take to heart their oath. It is almost reminiscent of being in the classroom when one student acts out and the whole class is punished or growing up in a household of siblings in which if one got in trouble everyone else also was in trouble.



When some people look at an officer of the law, they often forget that there's a human being behind the badge. I recall another public incident that resulted from a viral video of public outcry in response to the officer who fatally shot Michael Brown. The immediate reaction is to generalize all law enforcement officers as bad guys, but I would like to share with you a perspective from the other side of the law.

Many youth who grow up wanting to help others have aspirations of being a doctor, lawyer, teacher, social worker, nurse, or fire fighter. Ironically, young Treasa Dumas chose to enter the field of law enforcement so that she could help people. A common generalization from the public is that law enforcement officers are only fixated on issuing traffic citations and making arrests. While that may be true for some, it is not the reality of most law enforcement officers. When assigned to a beat or even a cell block in a detention center, officers interact with the same people frequently and they begin to develop trust and have earnest conversations that reveal that the person who is "in trouble with the law" committed a criminal act out of desperation, lack of training and exposure on how to navigate society, or the result of generations of criminal activity within the family or neighborhood.

Dt. Treasa Dumas-Jackson completed her undergraduate studies at Valdosta State University and earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice. Upon graduation, she began working at the City of Atlanta Detention Center. There she encountered a lot of repeat and first-time offenders and quickly recognized that some offenders enter the system at a young age, and some had no knowledge of the criminal justice and legal system nor anyone to advocate for them.

During her career as a school resource officer at a middle school, Dt. Dumas-Jackson counseled young people who displayed behaviors that if not diverted, would land them in jail or prison. She found that the power of holding youth accountable, demonstrating that someone believes in them, and has a vested interest in their success was a catalyst for them to make better life decisions. Some of the students returned to thank her for being a part of their lives and steering them in the right direction. She inspired a couple of the students so much that they entered the field of law enforcement.

Dt. Dumas-Jackson has worked for the Spalding County Sheriff's Office for 19 years and is a Lieutenant of Inmate Services and Classification. Her daily job is to handle inquiries from inmates regarding various topics, specifically, the judicial process. She classifies inmates for the Inmate Worker and Safe Serve programs. These programs assist inmates with acquiring certification for the Food Services Program thereby equipping them with a skillset to become gainfully employed. Successful completion of the program ends with the offender's probation being eradicated and them earning a Safe Serve certification. Those who complete the program are highly sought candidates for viable employment with national seafood and steak restaurants.

Dt. Dumas-Jackson is also a certified instructor and recently earned her Masters of Public Safety Administration from Columbus State University. Immediately after her graduation, the Sheriff encouraged her to attend polygraph school. She is now a certified Forensic Psychophysiologicalist. She plans to retire within the next few years and to enjoy a second career in private practice using her knowledge and skillset to help clear the innocent.

When asked how she felt about the current climate of law enforcement, she said, "Law enforcement is more than being the police, it is a career – not just a job. If you can impact one person, it makes a difference!"

Dt. Treasa Dumas-Jackson joined Nabbar Court in March of 2012 and is currently the 1st Lieutenant Commandress and chair of the Newsletter, Joint Ball, and Ways and Means Committee. She has been married to William Jackson for 20 years and has three beautiful daughters, Naisha, Nakayla, and Nazari; and Peyton, her beloved fur kid.






Dt. Kiema Mosley sang a powerful musical selection, and the meeting was closed after remarks from the Deputies.

Ruth Stevenson received her early education at Tim Watson Elementary and High School in Covington, Virginia. She exhibited leadership qualities early in life and participated in many activities in elementary and high school. She was very active in sports and in the Drama Club. She graduated from Tim Watson High School in 1951 with a graduating class of 50.
